

Mother and Preterm Twins Win Over Rare Pregnancy Complication

Through Advanced Multidisciplinary Care

Successful management of acute pancreatitis and uncontrolled gestational diabetes leads to safe preterm twin delivery and healthy recovery for mother and babies

A rare and high-risk pregnancy involving acute pancreatitis and uncontrolled gestational diabetes was successfully managed by a multidisciplinary team at Medicover Hospitals, leading to the safe delivery of preterm twins and the healthy recovery of both mother and babies.

The expectant mother, carrying twins, was admitted at around 30 weeks of pregnancy with acute pancreatitis, a rare but serious condition that occurs in approximately 1 in 1,000 to 1 in 5,000 pregnancies. The condition was further complicated by uncontrolled gestational diabetes, significantly increasing the risk to both mother and babies.

India accounts for nearly 3.5 million preterm births every year, with



twin pregnancies carrying a higher risk of premature delivery and neonatal complications. Recognizing the complexity of the case, a team comprising specialists from Obstetrics & Gynecology, General Medicine, Critical Care, Endocrinology, Anesthesiology, and Neonatology worked together to closely monitor and manage the patient.

Following intensive medical treatment and continuous fetal surveillance, doctors identified abnormal Doppler findings indicating fetal compromise. In view of the evolving

situation, an emergency Caesarean section was performed at 32 weeks of gestation.

The procedure resulted in the successful delivery of preterm twins, who were immediately shifted to the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) for specialized care. Both babies responded well to treatment and were discharged along with their mother in stable condition.

Dr. Shalini Narayan, Consultant Obstetrician & Gynecologist, Medicover Hospitals, said, "This was a

highly challenging twin pregnancy. Timely fetal monitoring and coordinated teamwork enabled us to intervene at the right time and ensure a positive outcome for both mother and babies."

Dr. Shravani Reddy Karumuru, Consultant Physician, Department of General Medicine, said, "Acute pancreatitis during pregnancy is uncommon and can be life-threatening. Early diagnosis, careful monitoring, and prompt medical management played a crucial role in stabilizing the mother and preventing

complications." Dr. Gowri Shankar, Senior Consultant Anesthesiologist, Medicover Hospitals, played a critical role in the successful management of this high-risk case, ensuring safe anesthetic care during the emergency Caesarean section.

His timely intervention, meticulous perioperative planning, and close coordination with the multidisciplinary team were instrumental in achieving a positive outcome for both the mother and her preterm twins.

Dr. Ravinder Reddy Parige, HOD - Neonatology & Pediatrics, Medicover Woman & Child Hospitals, said, "Premature babies require specialized care during the initial weeks of life. With advanced NICU support and continuous monitoring, both twins recovered well and were able to go home healthy with their mother."

The successful outcome highlights the importance of early diagnosis, multidisciplinary expertise, advanced maternal-fetal care, specialized neonatal services, and coordinated clinical management in handling complex high-risk pregnancies.

Transfer Process Successfully Completed in the Health Department

The large-scale transfer process undertaken by the State Health Department has been successfully completed. To ensure uninterrupted medical services and maintain a balanced distribution of human resources across government healthcare institutions, the government transferred a total of 4,869 employees across 157 cadres.

Among these, the highest number of transfers took place under the Directorate of Public Health, where 2,258 employees were transferred. Doctors, nurses, and paramedical staff were also reorganized across various wings of the Health Department, government medical colleges, and teaching hospitals according to institutional requirements.

With inspections by the National Medical Commission (NMC) expected to begin soon in government medical colleges and affiliated teaching hospitals across the state, the govern-

ment exercised special caution in implementing the transfers.

The process was carried out to ensure that every medical college has the required number of faculty members, doctors, and staff in accordance with NMC standards.

At the same time, the government recognized that transferring a large number of employees from a single hospital at once could negatively affect patient care. Therefore, the transfer process was carefully planned and implemented to avoid disruptions in healthcare services.

As part of this process, only employees who had worked at the same station for four years or more were made eligible for transfer.

Allowing transfers for those with less than four years of service could have led to shortages of doctors, nurses, and other staff in district



hospitals. Health Department officials remained cautious, taking into account lessons learned from past experiences.

The state government is currently strengthening district hospitals, area hospitals, community health centers, and teaching hospitals at district headquarters with the goal of providing quality healthcare services at the district level

itself. Infrastructure and human resources are being expanded to make nearly 90% of required medical services available within districts.

As part of this strategy, newly recruited doctors, staff nurses, and paramedical personnel are also being posted primarily in rural and district-level healthcare institutions. This is expected to reduce staff shortages in rural areas and improve access to quality healthcare

locally. Patients who travel to government hospitals in cities such as Hyderabad and Warangal for treatment often face transportation and other expenses. To address this, the government is taking steps to ensure that necessary treatments are available within districts.

According to Health Department officials, by conducting the transfer process transparently and with due consideration for healthcare service requirements, the government has taken another significant step toward strengthening the state's healthcare system.

The transfers also moved employees who had been serving for long periods in the same stations, such as Hyderabad. As a result, doctors and staff who had worked for many years in district areas have now received opportunities to be posted in Hyderabad.

Many have expressed their satisfaction, and doctors have stated that the government's encouragement will motivate them to provide even better medical services to patients.

Modi's record sparks war of words: BJP slams Kharge for 'distorting facts'

Telangana BJP launched a sharp attack on Congress President Mallikarjun Kharge for questioning Prime Minister Narendra Modi's record as India's longest-serving elected Prime Minister. "Why does the Congress repeatedly raise historical issues only to expose itself to uncomfortable facts?" he asked.

State BJP chief spokesperson N.V. Subash, in a press

release, said that Kharge was ignoring the distinction between holding office before India's first general election and repeatedly winning democratic mandates. He asserted that Modi's uninterrupted tenure reflects the people's trust and accused the Congress of raising historical issues that expose its own contradictions.

Subash also highlighted Modi's rise from a humble background and his growing

global recognition, urging Kharge to "behave like a mature statesman" and refrain from making politically motivated criticism.

He further said, "A national leader should speak like a statesman and not like a loose cannon. Repeated attempts to undermine Prime Minister Modi's democratic achievements only expose the Congress party's frustration and disconnect from political realities."

Opposition spreading false information on sir

BJP State President N Ramchander Rao today criticised the Congress, BRS, and MIM parties for misleading the public and spreading false information on Special Intensive Revision (SIR) process.

Addressing media at Siddipet who arrived to participate in party's karyakartas training classes, Rao clarified that SIR is not a BJP program, but a systematic and constitutional process undertaken by the Election Commission of India to clean up and update the voters' list.

He recalled that such electoral roll revisions have taken place several times since 1951, with the last comprehensive revision occurring in 2002. He noted that between 2002 and 2026, many individuals might have passed away, changed residences, or had their names registered in more than one place and to implement the principle of "one person, one vote," it is necessary to remove the names of the deceased, duplicate entries, and illegal names from the voters' list, he explained.

Rao said that the purpose of SIR is to strengthen democracy by preparing a transparent and robust electoral roll. He assured that every genuine voter has the right to vote where they residing and the name of no eligible voter will be removed. He strongly condemned the malicious propaganda by the BRS and Congress parties claiming

that voters would lose their property rights if they shifted their vote to the area where they work or reside.

He criticized that while the Congress government is applying Booth Level Agents (BLAs) on one hand, Congress leaders are spreading false propaganda about it on the other. Similarly, he exposed the MIM party, stating that while they are setting up help desks for SIR, they are simultaneously creating fear among the public by claiming that votes are being deleted by participating in the process on one hand while spreading false propaganda on the other.

He clarified that the voters' list is prepared by the Election Commission, an independent constitutional body, and neither the Bharatiya Janata Party nor the Central Government has any connection to it. He stated that they have no role in the removal of voters. He added that Booth Level Officers (BLOs) are appointed by the state government, so blaming the BJP for every little thing is merely political drama.

Rao mentioned that when they were in the opposition, they participated in SIR and other electoral processes out of faith in democracy, but today, Congress, BRS, MIM, and the INDIA bloc parties are opposing this process solely for vote-bank politics.

He questioned Congress leaders as to why SIR, EVMS,

and the Election Commission seem great when Congress wins, but they find fault with the very same institutions when they lose. He demanded to know why there were no doubts raised about EVMS when Congress won in states like Kerala, Himachal Pradesh, and Karnataka. He criticized that it has become a habit for the INDI alliance to call it the people's mandate if they win, but blame EVMS and the Election Commission if they lose.

He remarked that BRS has no moral right to speak about Telangana. He alleged that BRS MPs were absent in Parliament during the passage of the Telangana Bill, and after the formation of Telangana, only KCR's family benefited, while farmers, youth, employees, and the common people suffered. Exposing the failures of both parties, he stated that the state government has completely failed on issues such as farmer suicides, delay in implementing Rythu Bharosa, pending fee reimbursement dues, and employee grievances. BJP state chief asserted that BJP is the only real opposition in Telangana, fighting for the rights of farmers, youth, women, and all sections of society. He expressed confidence that the people have already given opportunities to BRS and Congress, and now they want to vote BJP to power. He said that BJP is a party of the people and will always fight on behalf of the people of Telangana.

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
